## TWO PIECES FOR SOLO LAPTOP

#### For solo laptop performer

Galap and Levi may be performed together as a two-movement work, or alone as single-movement works. If performed together, Galap goes first, Levi second.

### Equipment

1 laptop

2 audio monitors

1 CD-R containing software and other important files

#### Use of Software

Copy the contents of the CD-R to the desktop of your computer.

For Mac OSX:

/Two Pieces for Solo Laptop(CD-R)/Applications/MacOSX/→ open Galap or Levi application file For Win XP:

/Two Pieces for Solo Laptop(CD-R)/Applications/WinXP/Galap or Levi/→ open Galap.exe or Levi.exe

#### PERFORMING THE WORK REMOTELY (OVER INTERNET OR LAN):

Included in the MacOSX and WinXP folders are alternative versions of the programs (Galap\_remote and Levi\_remote) that allow the work to be performed remotely via Internet or LAN. Before a performance of the work, after opening the program on each computer, click on the "Set IP Address" button and follow the directions contained in the popup window. Using this version of the program, the following scenarios are possible:

- 1. One person performs the work simultaneously in two or more places both on his/her own "host" computer and on any number of other computers connected to the "host" computer.
- 2. Two people stationed at different computers simultaneously manipulate each other's programs (sharing performance responsibilities indicated in the score). This scenario allows for a four-handed version of the program with enhanced virtuosity in performance capabilities.

Monitor resolution: 1280 x 854 or larger

#### Performance Instructions

You control your instrument by typing various messages/commands into the text-command window. To bring focus to the text-command window press return/enter or simply click your mouse on it (the upper of the two windows, that is – the lower window shows your previously entered command).

Study the Key of Commands (included in the score) to learn how to play your instruments.

Your score consists of, among other things, a sequential list of commands that you are to enter during performance. Start at the top of the page and work your way down. If two or more commands appear in one line of text connected by arrows ( $\rightarrow$ ), you should type and enter them with little or no pause between commands. If two commands are each on their own line, one above the other, and there is no information regarding timing between the two, you may progress at your own rate. Some sections in your score will contain a box of text. Read these instructions after typing the required commands. They contain important information regarding your improvisational parameters.
